Celebrating Small Business . . . The Soul of Kansas City



The Fourth Annual 25 Under 25 Awards show borrowed its theme "Celebrating Small Business: The Soul of Kansas City," from our city's rich jazz heritage. More than 500 guests celebrated with the honorees at the Saturday evening gala at the Doubletree Hotel in Overland Park, Kan., on Feb. 26.

The annual awards, presented by Kansas City Small Business Monthly, honor 25 Kansas City area for-profit businesses with under 25 employees. Eligible businesses must have been operating for at least three years and have demonstrated consistent growth, fostered a culture of giving back to the community and shown an ability to overcome obstacles.



All That Jazz

The evening kicked into full swing with a packed networking reception featuring the popular Wall of Fame that showcased the 25 honored companies.

The Dave Stephens Band set the mood for the gala with several swing and jazz numbers before dinner. Former KCTV 5 news anchor Valissa Smith kept the jazz theme alive as she introduced each honored company, and the Dave Stephens Band ushered each honoree to the stage

with their upbeat strains. Proffer Productions created a succession of video montages that featured the honorees and incorporated well-known area jazz venues.

Host Kelly Scanlon, publisher of Kansas City Small Business Monthly, and Brian Butler, director of Supplier Diversity at Sprint, presented the awards to the owners of the honored businesses.

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groups of award presentations, several well-known area entrepreneurs offered videotaped words of inspiration to the honorees and their guests. These special luminaries included Steve and Joan Carter, Right Management; Chuck Rappe and Larry Bedell, Nitro Fitness; Ed Honesty, Best Harvest Bakery; and Ray Pitman, former owner of Pitman Manufacturing and a serial entrepreneur.

Gaining Momentum

The 25 Under 25 awards program continues to grow in popularity and to gain support within the business community.

"Our ongoing mission is to get the word out that small businesses are the driving force in the economy. More than 87 percent of businesses nationwide have no more than 19 employees. That's a huge segment—individually they may not seem significant, but collectively they account for most of the business that's done in this country," said Scanlon.

She noted that the cooperation of key players in the business community who sponsor the event, serve on the advisory board, and act as judges is essential to the success of the program. She also said she appreciated the support of honorees from previous classes who have stepped forward into these roles.

"These community and business leaders understand the importance of small business in our economy and recognize the 25 Under 25 Awards as a vehicle for helping these businesses get the recognition they deserve," she said.

Sprint, the co-title sponsor of the event since its inception in 2001, returned in that role. Several other businesses and organizations also sponsored the 2005 program.
